Volunteers Recognized at Annual Dinner

On December 3rd, Jasper County Conservation supporters were recognized and thanked for their efforts at a dinner in the Jasper County Community Center building. This is the fourth year an appreciation dinner has been organized.

A meal was prepared and served by Jasper County Conservation staff members for about 50 attendees. Conservation board members in attendance were Robyn Friedman, Andy Stone and Carol Kramer. Conservation staff present were Keri Van Zante, Jade Read, Katie Cantu, Greg Oldsen, Jerry Ratliff, Ethan Vander Pol and Dennis Cooling.

Volunteers were thanked for helping to make the conservation department's events run smoothly and be successful, including large family programs such as the Off the Beaten Path Trail Race, Fall Festival, and Halloween Hike. Volunteers also helped on school field trips, at hunter education courses, with park maintenance, and other projects. Jasper County Conservation staff members see over 15,000 people annually at programs and manage over 3,000 acres of public park land, much of what is accomplished with the help of volunteers and special donors.

After each staff member gave an update from the past year, special awards were given out to several outstanding volunteers. "Volunteer of the Year" went to Marti Davis for helping at many events including the Caring for Conservation Auction and Fall Festival. Carol Kramer received the "Pioneer Award" for her lifetime of involvement with conservation and environmental education. Mark Law was given the "Environmental Educator of the Year" award for his work on 5th grade field trips at Ashton Park and his efforts to promote the importance of environmental education at the middle school level.

Jasper County Conservation staff recognize new volunteers who really jump in with both feet, and this year there were two! The "Fledgling Awards" were given to Joyce Finch and Kaylene Rinehart, who have been involved with many programs and have provided staff with an immense amount of support. Lastly, a very special group of people were recognized as Jasper County's "Friends of Conservation." The Emerson Hough Chapter of the Izaak Walton League was awarded this honor for all their support for conservation programs, especially the hunter education classes, summer youth camps, and the Halloween Hike. The Conservation Board is grateful for this group's passion and commitment to conservation and natural resources, and their willingness to partner for large public events.

Upcoming Maple Syrup Season

Our staff is excited for next year's maple syrup season. Last year was the first season in our new sugar shack at Jacob Krumm Nature Preserve and we learned a lot along the way. This year we look forward to expanding the operation from around 80 taps to our goal of 150.

From last season we have added a new ventilation system, concrete sidewalks and loading pad, as well as a new 330 gallon storage tank and 35 gallon head tank. The Sugar Shack will be open to the public during operation hours for a short tour and explanation of the process.

Once production starts, Uncle Jake's Pure Maple Syrup will for sale at our office while supplies last. We look forward to another great year and hope to see you out there!

Volunteer Spotlight

When thinking about an individual who is committed to Iowa's environment and the conservation of our natural resources, my mind immediately focuses upon Carol Kramer. Carol, a Native American originally from Minnesota, has been a member of the Jasper County Conservation Board since 1987 and is completely dedicated to educating our community about the beauty and importance of everything that surrounds us. Carol is a retired 6th grade teacher from Newton, but retirement to her, never meant the end of teaching. Carol is actively involved with the Jasper County Conservation Board's outdoor education program and often delivers enthusiastic interpretations about the lessons that were instilled in her while "Growing Up Ojibway". Carol has also been proactive in the planning and fundraising for a new environmental education center in Jasper County. Carol played a key role as a long-time board member on the DNR Natural Resource Commission (NRC), as well as many local non-profit conservation groups such as Project AWAKE and Jasper Conservation Connection.

Carol has been involved in much positive change in Jasper County. The water quality at Mariposa Recreation Area has been discussed for years, and Carol played an integral role in keeping that conversation active and ensuring that a solution was reached. None of this project would have been possible without the continued support of Carol and her communication with the community and our legislators.

Carol has also played a key role in bike trail development in Jasper County. The Chichaqua Valley Trail is one of Iowa's oldest rail trails and a significant segment of the eastern loop of the Central Iowa Trail loop. The corridor links five communities and two counties which provides a regional trail experience for nearly 500,000 people. Carol has been involved with the Chichaqua since its initial development, as well as with the future extensions that are being investigated.

Carol has numerous park and recreation development credentials, from the 450-acre Jacob Krumm Nature Preserve, to the 250-acre Pheasants Forever Unit of the South Skunk hunting area, the 32-acre Hartley Heritage Fen, and the 180-acre Reimer Refuge. The acquisition and development of all of these areas was spearheaded by Carol's progressive attitude toward preserving wild areas and making them available for public enjoyment.

I often encounter former students of Carol Kramer's who are now parents or even educators, and I am immediately filled with stories about how Carol influenced their schooling, career choice, and even life direction. Only a truly amazing person can touch so many with her love and knowledge of our environment.
